## Key Findings

Benefits paid by state and local pension plans support a significant amount of economic activity in the state of Montana.

Pension benefits received by retirees are spent in the local community. This spending ripples through the economy, as one person's spending becomes another person's income, creating a multiplier effect.

In 2020, expenditures stemming from state and local pensions supported...

9,314 jobs that paid \$446.2 million in wages and salaries

\$1.4 billion in total economic output

\$186.1 million in federal, state, and local tax revenues

... in the state of Montana.

Each dollar paid out in pension benefits supported \$1.44 in total economic activity in Montana.

Each dollar "invested" by Montana taxpayers in these pension plans supported \$6.79 in total economic activity in the state.

### Measuring the Economic Impact of DB Pension Expenditures




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### Overview

Expenditures made by retirees of state and local government provide a steady economic stimulus to Montana communities and the state economy. In 2020, 46,026 residents of Montana received a total of \$939.5 million in pension benefits from state and local pension plans.



The average pension benefit received was \$1,701 per month or \$20,413 per year. These modest benefits provide retired teachers, public safety personnel, and others who served the public during their working careers income to meet basic needs in retirement.

Between 1993 and 2020, 21% of Montana's pension fund receipts came from employer contributions, 17% from employee contributions, and 62% from investment earnings.\* Earnings on investments and employee contributions—not taxpayer based contributions—have historically made up the bulk of pension fund receipts.

### Impact on Jobs and Incomes

Retiree expenditures stemming from state and local pension plan benefits supported 9,314 jobs in the state. The total income to state residents supported by pension expenditures was \$446.2 million.

To put these employment impacts in perspective, in 2020 Montana's unemployment rate was 5.8%. The fact that DB pension expenditures supported 9,314 jobs is significant, as it represents 1.7 percentage points in Montana's labor force.

### Economic Impact


State and local pension funds in Montana and other states paid a total of \$939.5 million in benefits to Montana residents in 2020. Retirees' expenditures from these benefits supported a total of \$1.4 billion in total economic output in the state, and \$735.1 million in value added in the state.

### Impact on Tax Revenues

State and local pension payments made to Montana residents supported a total of \$186.1 million in revenue to federal, state, and local governments. Taxes paid by retirees and beneficiaries directly out of pension payments totaled \$47.8 million. Taxes attributable to pension expenditures in the local economy accounted for \$138.3 million in tax revenue.

## Economic Impacts by Industry Sector

The economic impact of state and local pension benefits was broadly felt across various industry sectors in Montana. The five industry sectors with the largest employment impacts are presented in the table to the side.

Industry	Employment Impact (# Jobs)
Hospitals	774
Limited-service restaurants	544
Full-service restaurants	455
Other real estate	386
Retail - food and beverage stores	311

Industry totals include the first round of impacts from pension payments to state residents, and do not account for recaptured “leakage” to or from other states.

## Economic Impacts by Occupation Category

The pension benefits in Montana supported jobs in every civilian job category, as shown in the table below.
